24	into the Board, and allow you to make your decisions,
25	I just wanted to give you just a little bit of

Page 6 history on how PRLU, the Placement Residential 1 Licensing Unit, got involved with the ROAR program 2 3 and their request. So, back, in October of 2020, we did receive an 4 inquiry for what they needed to do to obtain a 5 residential license. We provided that information to 6 7 them, however we did not receive a completed application by the December 8th Child Welfare Agency 8 9 Review Board Meeting. We also received information, in December, of 2020, that there were expectations of 10 11 opening the facility at the beginning of February 12 2021. So, in between that time, the Placement and 13 Residential Licensing Unit worked with that agency to 14 get that application prepared and available. So this 15 is where we are now. And, Mr. Flynn, I'll go ahead 16 and turn it over to you. MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: 17 18 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: I'll call this meeting 19 officially to order here. The Child Welfare Agency 20 Review Board Special Meeting. And who's going to be 21 presenting today, Ebony? 22 MS. EBONY RUSS: I'm sorry. It will be Shay 23 Litzey, Sharra Litzey. 24 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Okay. Well let's go ahead 25 then.

## 1 PRESENTATION:

2 MS. SHARRA SINGLETON LITZEY: Hi. This is 3 Sharra Litzey. I'm a Program Coordinator with the Placement and Residential Licensing Unit. 4 Rite of Passage, the owner of the residential 5 option, of adolescents in recovery, is requesting a 6 7 residential childcare license with the capacity of 24 clients, ages 13 to 18, that will be court ordered 8 9 into the program for up to 90 days for substance 10 abuse treatment. Rites (sic) of Passage has several 11 contracts with DYS programs throughout the state of 12 Arkansas. Rite of Passage has a history of meeting 13 the needs of Arkansas most vulnerable population. 14 Based on the information received from the agency, 15 the Licensing Unit recommends that Rites of Passage, the owner of Louisville Treatment Center, be granted 16 a provisional residential license, upon meeting the 17 18 requirement of submitting the requests from the 19 Health Department.

20CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. Who21will be speaking on behalf of Rite of Passage today?22MS. SHARRA SINGLETON LITZEY: Dr. Martha23Whitfield.

CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: All right. Well let's just turn the microphone over to her, please, and --

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Dr. Whitfield. And would you just give us -- you know, some of us may be more familiar with the Rite of Passage than others -- just a brief background of who you are, what you have been doing, and how you came to this place, how you ended up before us today?

DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Okay. Well Rite of 6 7 Passage is an organization that's been in business for over 35 years helping youth all over the country, 8 9 with a focus on at risk youth, youth in foster care. 10 We also have programs that have youth who have been 11 sex trafficked, so our -- Rite of Passage mission is 12 to help these kids have better lives. So, back, in 13 October, we received word that DYS had received a 14 grant to open a substance abuse treatment facility and that we were going to partner with them. And, 15 16 basically, our goal is to open this facility for 24 17 young men, who have substance abuse issues, and take 18 them through a 90-day residential program, where they 19 will focus on substance abuse treatment, other 20 treatment, and health and nutrition, and lifestyle focuses. And they will also attend school to keep up 21 22 with their credits and seat-time, so that when they 23 return back to their homes they won't be behind in 24 their school.

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CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Thank you. So, I guess,

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Page 9 everything is in place for y'all to maybe begin as 1 2 soon as this is approved? DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yes, sir. We are very 3 close. There are still some ends we need to wrap up 4 5 and some things we have to do, but, overall, the site is ready; our staff is there; they're already being 6 7 trained; and we are getting there. CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Okay. Very good. Now, I 8 9 know we just received the information last night and 10 some of you Board Members, like me, have not -- has 11 not had time today to read -- to just thoroughly 12 review this, but does any of the board members have 13 any questions or comments? QUESTIONS FROM THE BOARD: 14 15 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: This is Sanford Tollette, Mr. Chair. 16 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: 17 Okay. 18 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: To Doc, is there 19 going to be any kind of career awareness kinds of 20 curricular you're going to do as a part of this 21 therapy and, second, where are you located? 22 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Well, I'll address the 23 location first. It is in Louisville, Arkansas, about 24 30 minutes outside of Hope, Arkansas. It used to be 25 the Louisville Juvenile Treatment Center, which was

Page 10 part of DYS, that housed and provided treatment for 1 adjudicated youth. So that's where we are now. 2 And, 3 as far as career, there are some things that we will be doing with the students. However, it's important 4 5 to understand that they will be in treatment for over -- for 28 hours a week. And that will include both 6 7 education, education treatment classes, their groups, and their individual therapies to deal with their 8 9 substance abuse issues, so we are not planning on 10 offering any career and technical education. We are 11 going to be offering some online certifications, for 12 those students that are interested and have time, and 13 they'll be able to get OSHA certified in any of the 14 careers that they're interested in while they are there. But it is only a 90-day program. 15 16 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: Okay. Thank 17 you. 18 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Sure. 19 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Andy, I saw that hand. 20 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Yeah, I have a couple 21 of questions. The first question is I appreciate 22 getting an updated budget and I'm assuming that 23 Louisville, Alaska is actually Louisville, Arkansas? 24 UNKNOWN: I noticed the same thing, Andy. 25 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: I wanted to get it on

Page 11 the record, so they don't think we're approving 1 something in Alaska. 2 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Good point. 3 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yeah, definitely in 4 5 Arkansas. I'm not sure what happened there. CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Yeah, AR is the 6 7 abbreviation; AK is the abbreviation for Alaska. DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yes. 8 9 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: The other question I 10 have is I noticed in your write up -- I actually, 11 believe it or not, got to read every bit of this 12 packet, and I'm curious to -- I noticed that you guys 13 used evidence based programming. Could you tell us a little bit about that? 14 15 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: I -- well I am definitely 16 not a clinical expert; my expertise is in education. 17 Mr. Morrow, can you provide some insight on the 18 clinical over there? 19 MR. MARLON MORROW: Yeah, so basically what 20 we're doing, in terms of evidence based, will be 21 looking at groups like aggression -- ART -- from 22 replacement therapy, cognitive groups; positive 23 skills development; we are a big advocacy of Dr. 24 Edward Tesla (sic) and Dr. Jeffery Butson's (sic) 25 social learning theories. So those -- the treatment

Page 12 1 plan, or the treatment menu, that we're planning for 2 these youth, center around that. And, then, in terms 3 of substance abuse, we also partner with the UCCI, which is out of the University of Cincinnati, with 4 5 Dr. Paula Smith, that have built a curriculum around substance abuse, for us, that we -- typically, we 6 7 also use that in our other programs. And all of that has been researched as far as evidence based. 8 9 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: And my last question 10 is do you guys fall under ADAP licensing as well, 11 because you're a substance abuse treatment program? 12 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Well we are going through 13 the ODAP (sic) licensing, the Office of Alcohol and 14 Drug Abuse Prevention, yes, sir. 15 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Will that be a conflict with the licensure with us? 16 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Not to my knowledge. 17 18 There were some minor differences. For example, in 19 room size, your requirement was different that ODAP 20 (sic), so we went with the largest room size 21 requirement. So there were a few adjustments that we 22 had to make, but all of the requirements should be met with both entities. 23 24 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Thank you. 25 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Sure.

Page 13 1 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Any other questions from 2 Board Members. BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: Sanford, here. 3 I didn't get a chance to read it, so I apologize, and 4 I won't act like I did, when I didn't. I believe in 5 being honest. I was born in Hope, Arkansas, so, 6 7 counter to my colleague, I kinda knew what you were talking about in terms of the area, not Alaska. 8 9 That's happened to me before. But how many staff are 10 you going to have and, you know, break down the 11 qualification of staff. 12 MR. MARLON MORROW: Okay. So, currently, the 13 total number of staff is 44. The program director is Dr. Deidra Hamen (sic). So she's a doctorate level 14 15 care -- actually, she's a doctorate level in 16 psychology. Then we have a clinical director, as 17 well, her name is Veronica White. She is licenced --18 actually, both of them are licensed out of Arkansas. 19 We will have two additional therapists, obviously, 20 that would meet the licensing requirement for 21 Arkansas. And then, we do have, in terms of just 22 direct care, our ratio is going to be, like, 1:4, so, 23 when you look at that in terms of the two units, 24 we'll have two shift supervisors, along with the 25 senior staff, and then, along with what we call kinda

Page 14 first tier staff. So that ratio of 3 on that 12, you 1 2 know, is a plus ratio for us. And then, of course, 3 we have ancillary that's made up of, you know, three staff there. We do have two medical personnel, which 4 will have a ART on both of our ends. And then we 5 also have a staff trainer, who is a past lawyer. 6 7 Most of her experience is in the legal side of things. And then we have the maintenance department. 8 9 And then human resources. So, with all of that, I 10 think it totals to 43 to 44 people. And then our 11 overnight staff is just as rich, in terms of ratio. 12 I think there's 10 of them. And what I like about 13 the night staff, with the ratio, there's no shift 14 differential. So their expectation is to learn all 15 the program addicts, as they would during the day. 16 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: All right. 17 Thank you. 18 MR. MARLON MORROW: Welcome. 19 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Is there any aftercare, 20 follow up, for the gentlemen that graduate your 21 program? 22 MR. MARLON MORROW: Yeah, and I apologize. We 23 do have three peer supports. Those peer supports 24 will follow those youth for 6 months, after they 25 graduate this program. And so then we'll also -- the

beauty of that, also, is that, being that our ROP is 1 within Arkansas, we can utilize other resources from 2 -- for example, if the youth is from North Little 3 Rock, we do have people that are down there that can 4 5 help with that kind of what we call wrap around services. But we do have three peer -- what they 6 7 call peer supports, who will be responsible for following the youth, after their graduation day over 8 9 the program. And, quite frankly, will actually meet 10 them prior to them leaving, so they'll kind of go 11 through the program along with, and then as they are 12 setting up the resources, and then setting up things, 13 once they graduate, so there will be a easier 14 transition, once they're here, and able to return 15 back to the community. That aftercare or peer 16 support person would know that youth from day one, 17 moving them all the way through, and then as they 18 follow through. So, guite frankly, they'll have an 19 additional -- it'll be nine months to almost a year. 20 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Very good.

21 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: Sanford Tollette 22 again. My last question. Are you familiar -- and 23 I've been an opponent of this for a long time -- and, 24 early on, when I was young and full of energy, back 25 in the 70's, I did a lot of alcohol, tobacco, and

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drug awareness programs for youth. Are you familiar with the concept of experiential learning, as it relates to your mission, for substance abuse, and, if you have any kind of concepts of program ideas, that give me a flavor of what the students or clients will be exposed to. Just briefly, there.

7 MR. MARLON MORROW: Yes. And we do have experience in that and, actually, that's kind of what 8 9 we build our menu on, as well. And, in particular, 10 we have some curricula that addresses that. For an 11 example, we have eight manuals out -- I'll be happy 12 to get to you, if you want to see those -- that are 13 all based on really when -- how the youth answer 14 those questions. And then the other piece of that is that, when they when we take them through those 15 16 actual manuals, the thing that we also want to do is 17 that the strengths and weaknesses that they are 18 developing here at program, for an example, we have a 19 greenhouse that is here. That greenhouse is going to 20 be utilized to help grow, and help nurture, and, you 21 know, in them working that, and they see how that 22 goes back. Well we want to take it to an additional 23 step, which is go down on the corner and then have a 24 little fruit stand, or a vegetable stand, and then 25 they actually get to partake in that. And then they

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Page 17 will be able to exchange those funds and see how that 1 2 real world works, how you feed yourself, and how you 3 can give back to the community, and then work that same, back. So we -- that's what were excited about, 4 5 because it gives these young men an opportunity to kind of reap what you sow, so to speak, through 6 7 positive experiences, and all those things like that. So were big fans of that. 8 9 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: And that gets 10 into marketing and learning how to make money a 11 different way than selling some other products. 12 MR. MARLON MORROW: Exactly, yes, sir. 13 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: I'm feeling you. 14 I'm feeling you. That's entrepreneurial skills. That's career awareness, to me. 15 16 MR. MARLON MORROW: Yes, sir. BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: 17 That's 18 opportunity. So, thank you, so much, for answering 19 my question. I didn't read it, so I don't want to 20 belabor my curiosity, but, thank you. 21 MR. MARLON MORROW: No problem. 22 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Andy, you have a question? 23 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: I do. I have a 24 question about the -- this is just a DYS program? Is 25 that correct? Am I reading --

Page 18 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: No, it is not a DYS 1 program. It is a grant through DHS. So -- but we 2 are working in both partnership with both DYS and 3 DHS. 4 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Okay. So -- but does 5 it require a court order for a child to be 6 7 (INAUDIBLE)? 8 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: No, sir. Students can be 9 placed, from court, but it's a program where they --10 the families can sign them up; a judge can request 11 that they go; but the kids will not be adjudicated. 12 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Okay. And then my --13 and this truly is my last question. This is for a 24-bed license, correct? 14 15 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yes, sir. 16 BOARD MEMBER ANDY ALTOM: Okay. 17 MS. EBONY RUSS: Mr. Flynn, there is a question 18 from the court reporter in the chat box that says, 19 "Should anyone be administered the oath?" 20 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: I've never seen anyone 21 administered an oath in 20 years on this board, so --22 Sandi? 23 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: I guess I was just 24 trying to --25 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Or are you swearing in? I

Page 19 saw your hand; were you swearing in? 1 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: Both. I swear. 2 I swear. One question. I guess I misread it, because 3 I thought they were all court ordered youth, when I 4 read this. 5 MR. MARLON MORROW: No, ma'am. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: And that's pretty much what it says, "court ordered." But now your 8 9 saying, "No, a family can contact and sign the kids 10 up; they don't have to be court ordered? 11 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yes, ma'am. 12 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: Y'all may want to 13 look at the packet, because I may have read it wrong, but it reads --14 15 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: You did not. 16 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: -- as if they're court ordered. 17 18 DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Which part of the packet? 19 MR. MIKE CANTRELL: The referrals will come 20 through the court. DR. MARTHA WHITFIELD: Yes. 21 22 MR. MIKE CANTRELL: But the court -- the 23 referrals will come through the court, ma'am, but 24 these will be non-adjudicated youth and it won't be 25 court ordered. So, if we get a young man who comes

Page 20 1 into our program, that, for whatever reason, decides 2 he doesn't want to work the program, whatever the case may be, then, obviously, you know, since it's 3 not court ordered, and it's not adjudicated, we have 4 5 the opportunity to remove that student, if he's not willing to work the program or having problems 6 7 struggling with the program. But the way DHS has set this up is that they have educated each of the 8 9 courts, in the state of Arkansas, about the program, 10 and about the referral process, and they understand 11 the criteria of the young man that can be referred. 12 As we are focusing on the ASAM Level 3.5 kids. So 13 that would be non-adjudicated kids. BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: But they will have 14 all had court involvement, just not adjudicated? 15 MR. MARLON MORROW: That's correct. 16 BOARD MEMBER SANDI DOHERTY: Okay. 17 18 MR. MIKE CANTRELL: That's correct. 19 MS. EBONY RUSS: Mr. Cantrell, just for the 20 court reporter, I just want to make sure that's you 21 talking. 22 MR. MIKE CANTRELL: Yes, that's Mike Cantrell, Executive Director. 23 24 MS. EBONY RUSS: Thank you. 25 MR. MIKE CANTRELL: Uh-huh.

Page 21 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Anyone else? All right. 1 If no one else has a question, I would entertain a 2 motion from the board. 3 MS. SHARRA SINGLETON LITZEY: This is Sharra 4 Litzey, Program Coordinator. I have not made the 5 6 recommendation yet. 7 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Oh, that's -- well -- I thought I heard that y'all recommended it, but go 8 9 ahead. 10 MS. SHARRA SINGLETON LITZEY: The Rite of Passage, Louisville Treatment Center, appears to be 11 12 able to operate in full compliance with licensing 13 standards. The Placement and Residential Licensing Unit is in support of the agency being granted a new 14 15 provisional residential child care facility license contingent upon the approval of the health 16 17 inspections from Arkansas Department of Health. MOTIONS AND VOTES: 18 19 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: Thank you. Now, Andy, I 20 believe I saw your hand, you make a recommendation 21 that you approve this request. Is there a second? 22 BOARD MEMBER SANFORD TOLLETTE: I second, Sanford Tollette. 23 24 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: And a second by Sanford. 25 I don't think there's anymore discussion. If there

Page 22 is you better talk quick, because all in favor raise 1 your hand. 2 3 (MEMBERS RAISE HANDS). CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: And anyone opposed, by 4 like sign? 5 (NO RESPONSE) 6 7 CHAIR CHARLES FLYNN: And there is no one 8 opposed. So this request is approved. 9 Congratulations. Look forward to hearing some good 10 reports from y'all and look forward to seeing you 11 next year, when you come back to convert this into a 12 regular license. 13 MR. MARLON MORROW: Thank you. MR. MIKE CANTRELL: Thank you, very much. 14 15 UNKNOWN: Thank you, very much; we appreciate it. 16 DR. MARSHA WHITFIELD: 17 Thank you. 18 MR. TONY TENNER: Please come visit. 19 MR. MARLON MORROW: Yes.
