PROCEEDINGS 1 2 MR. APPLER: We have a guorum, so I'm 3 going to call the meeting to order. 4 As the adoption person on the board, I 5 have run up against several concerns that I 6 wanted to talk to the board about and I have 7 had a couple of conversations with our 8 attorney, Mr. West. 9 I have got clients who have home 10 studies that need to be renewed. However, 11 they are having trouble getting a physician 12 to conduct just a general physical on them, 13 which has to happen every year prior to the 14 placement of a child; also, regarding new 15 clients, making home visits. I don't think 16 it is such a good idea to make a home visit with a new client. 17 18 And what I'm hoping for is for the 19 board to make a motion that until, perhaps, 20 July 1, all home visits can be done 21 remotely. I'm also hoping for the board to 22 make a motion that home studies that are 23 expiring between now and July 1 can be 24 extended for 90 days. 25 So that's all I have to say at the

          The obstacle for me is I am 70 years

     old. I'm in a high-risk group and I don't
19
     want to go to a home that I have never been
20
     to before.

          MS. DOHERTY: So would that be just
22
     something you would ask for for your agency?
23
          MR. APPLER: Yes, at this point.
24
          MR. FLYNN: This is Charles Flynn.
25
          Ed, how long does this process take
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1	before that home would be approved?
2	MR. APPLER: We always do that within
3	60 days. But keep in mind, these are
4	private adoptions.
5	MR. FLYNN: Yes. So I guess what I'm
6	saying, even if you didn't make an initial
7	visit, if you could begin this but before
8	you completed the study, you would visit the
9	home. Is that does that make sense?
10	MR. APPLER: I missed that.
11	MR. FLYNN: Okay. I guess did
12	anybody else catch that?
13	I guess what I'm saying is that even if
14	you did not make an initial visit in the
15	home before you complete this home study,
16	would you have had time to go in that home?
17	I'm assuming this is not going to go on
18	indefinitely.
19	MR. APPLER: Right. With the current
20	technology that we are using right now,
21	today, where I can see you talking, Charles,
22	all of our clients are going to have laptops
23	and smart phones and things like that and
24	they can walk around their home and show me
25	every square inch of the home. They can

1	stand in a room so I can understand the
2	context of how large the room is. They can
3	show me their backyard, their dog,
4	everything. The only thing I won't be able
5	to do is pick up any smells that may exist.
6	So that is what I'm wanting to be able
7	to do for the next 90 days for Grace
8	Adoptions.
9	MR. ALTOM: This is Andy again.
10	I have got to just say, you know, I
11	have a heartburn with the situation we're in
12	right now and people are saying, well, we
13	should be doing home visits. I know I have
14	been on record as saying that I don't think
15	they should be happening. I think we should
16	be doing everything we can to try to flatten
17	the curve.
18	And when the governor basically has
19	cleaned out the hospitals and said all he
20	wants to do is worry about Covid, and
21	whenever you can't even get in to get a
22	physician's appointment for a physical, I
23	don't think this is a no-brainer, that we
24	need to do just like everybody else has done
25	and put this on hold or accept an extension

or whatever we need to do to be fair to our 1 2 constituents. 3 MR. APPLER: Thank you. I understand that DCFS is under 4 5 different requirements than private adoption 6 agencies are, and Mr. West sent me a copy of 7 the guidance that DCFS has issued to their 8 workers regarding home visits. 9 And, you know, that's for DCFS to do. 10 I'm fine with that. It's just that for 11 private adoptions, that guidance is not 12 going to work for Grace Adoptions. 13 MS. WILLIAMS: This as Tonya. I just 14 want to make a comment and I appreciate it. 15 I think all of you made really good 16 points and I think we definitely need to listen and be conscious of what is happening 17 18 out there and we want to remain safe, so I 19 appreciate Ed for bringing this forward. 20 I do want to point out, there -- you 21 know, I think it sounds like we have looked 22 at the legal side of it, Joe, and there may 23 be some things specifically for DCFS that 24 don't necessarily apply to everyone else, so 25 I think the legal part of it is -- that's

really important for me -- as the division 1 2 director, is to make sure that we are 3 following what we have to do legally. 4 But I also want to say that if we are 5 going to waive any requirements -- and you 6 all as a board can make that -- you know, 7 you can make that call here today and take a 8 vote on it, but we are running those 9 policies through and to the governor's 10 office so that he is aware of anything that 11 we are waiving. So I just want you guys to 12 know I will do that. 13 If you all make that vote and decide 14 that this is one that we are going to waive 15 as a current promulgated rule, I will write 16 it up and submit it for the agency to push 17 out, you know, and I think they go over to 18 the governor's office as well. I don't 19 think that will take a long time, just a day 20 or two, and then we can move it forward if 21 that's what the group decides. I just want to make sure you understand the processes 22 23 that we are under. 24 MR. APPLER: Right. I don't think we

25 are waiving anything. I think we are simply

suspending something for a short period of
 time.

I'm hearing. And, so, that's the things like we suspended some rules in childcare two weeks ago, and those all I think he made that announcement. He may not necessarily make this as an announcement, but they are all listed as rules that are suspended temporarily, whatever timeline you all put on it. And I know you have mentioned a timeline, but those all go through that process, so as a suspended rule for whatever period of time we want to put on it. MR. APPLER: I'm hoping in 90 days we will see a resolution here. And, so, that's what I'm asking for and if I need to make that motion, I will. MR. FLYNN: And, Ed, my only comment was, though, is if things do clear up in 60 or 90 days, wouldn't you probably visit that home at that point? MR. FLYNN: Yeah. That was my only	3	MS. WILLIAMS: Yeah, and that's what

But, if, in 60 days, 6 restaurants reopen, things like that, yeah, 7 I will be making home visits. 8 But until the governor reopens 9 everything, I don't think it's a good idea to be making home visits for me or Grace 10 11 Adoptions or any of my staff. 12 MR. ALTOM: So we need a motion to 13 discuss this further or do -- you know, I 14 guess I'm confused. I thought we make a motion first and then we discuss. 15 16 MR. APPLER: You know, usually -- so 17 I'm going to make a motion. I'm going to 18 make a motion that home visits can be 19 conducted remotely until July 1, 2020. 20 That's the motion. MR. ALTOM: I will second it. 21 22 MR. WEST: And, Mr. Chairman, this is 23 Joe West. 24 And I just kind of want to -- I just 25 want to give a quick bit of advice as far as

1	the motion goes, just kind of piggyback on	
2	what Tonya is saying, just for	
3	record-keeping purposes, that you make some	
4	kind of notation in your motion that this is	
5	as a result of the Covid-19 crisis and the	
6	guidance that has been issued by the	
7	governor and the Department of Health.	
8	MR. APPLER: Okay. Let me restate the	
9	motion.	
10	In light of the Coved-19 crisis and the	
11	governor's various executive orders, home	
12	visits will be conducted remotely until	
13	July 1.	
14	Does that work?	
15	MR. WEST: I think that would work.	
16	Like I said, just making a clean record.	
17	MR. APPLER: Right. Got it.	
18	MS. DOHERTY: So these are home visits	
19	for home this is Sandi home visits for	
20	the home studies?	
21	MR. APPLER: Correct. And our	
22	regulations require at least one home visit.	
23	MR. ALTOM: In fact, I think you're	
24	going to have to define what "remotely"	
25	means.

2	right now.	
3	MR. ALTOM: Right. But I think you are	
4	going to have to spell that out in the	
5	motion.	
6	MR. APPLER: Okay. So let me add that	
7	to the motion.	
8	The home visits can be conducted	
9	remotely by using Zoom or Skype or some	
10	other internet application that permits the	
11	social worker to see all of the home and the	
12	yard and all the people that live there in	
13	realtime.	
14	MR. ALTOM: I will second that.	
15	MR. APPLER: Okay. A second.	
16	Any further discussion?	
17	MS. FOTI: Yes. This is Beverly, Ed.	
18	Are you making a motion that we suspend	
19	the home study, the home visit, for all	
20	folks who are doing them or just for your	
21	agency?	
22	MR. APPLER: Just for my agency today.	
23	I do know that, like, Abba Adoptions is	
24	having has called me yesterday to ask the	
25	same question. And there aren't that many	

1	private agencies in Arkansas, but I know
2	that Abba would like to be under the same
3	conditions.
4	So I think I'm going to suggest that
5	for all private agencies. If they want to
6	go on a home visit, that's fine. But if
7	they don't, they should be able to do it
8	remotely as I had said in the motion.
9	MS. FOTI: I like that suggestion, that
10	it apply to all private adoption agencies.
11	MR. ALTOM: I do, too.
12	MR. APPLER: Okay. Then that's the
13	motion.
14	Okay. There has been a motion and a
15	second.
16	Is there any further discussion?
17	If none, all in favor, signify by
18	saying "aye," or something on this Zoom
19	thing.
20	UNANIMOUS: Aye.
21	MR. APPLER: Okay. So that passes.
22	All apposed, the same. Okay.
23	The other thing that I had brought up
24	is regarding physicians not wanting to
25	conduct general ordinary physicals when

1	clients have to renew their home study or	
2	have a new home study and have to have	
3	documentation of their good health.	
4	I think that in light of the prior	
5	motion, I think that because that is part of	
6	the home study, that can probably be	
7	suspended until July 1.	
8	Am I correct on that, Joe?	
9	MR. WEST: I think that would follow in	
10	line with that. I know the board has very	
11	broad alternative compliance powers. And as	
12	you have noted, the situation has evolved to	
13	the point that individuals who would	
14	normally be able to get these physicals are	
15	unable to because our medical systems are	
16	overworked, so I think that would be up to	
17	the discretion of the board.	
18	MR. APPLER: Okay. Okay.	
19	Now, moving on, last I heard, we were	
20	supposed to be having a meeting in late	
21	April. I just don't see that happening.	
22	MS. RUSS: April 28th is when it is	
23	scheduled.	
24	MR. APPLER: Uh-huh. I don't see	
25	meeting in Little Rock. Perhaps, a meeting

1	of this nature, but I don't see us meeting	
2	in a room in Little Rock.	
3	MS. WILLIAMS: Ed, I would agree. This	
4	is Tonya. And I would I work with Ebony.	
5	If we can arrange the remote meeting	
6	and that works for everyone, but I	
7	absolutely we're canceling meetings in	
8	April already. And I think you are	
9	absolutely correct. We don't need to	
10	schedule an on-site meeting.	
11	If we can arrange it remotely and this	
12	works for all of you, then we will send that	
13	out as a remote meeting and a call in, so I	
14	think that is a great suggestion.	
15	MR. APPLER: Okay. So, Tonya, what	
16	about the men and women who come to the	
17	meeting that are requesting alternative	
18	compliances, things like that, how would	
19	they be able to participate?	
20	MS. WILLIAMS: Yeah, that's a little	
21	more challenging, but let me see if we can	
22	work with some folks here to see how we	
23	might be able to make that happen.	
24	If you all have any ideas that is a	
25	little bit more challenging, but I think you	

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Page 15 are right. We don't need to have an on-site 1 2 if we can figure out a way to get them to 3 remote in and that may be a little more 4 tricky. 5 MR. APPLER: Okay. Now, what we do 6 have in place is, like, if there is a family 7 that DCFS needs to place a child with and 8 they had a background hit on their criminal 9 history, then Sandi would call me and 10 explain the situation to me and to Charles, 11 also, if I'm not available. And, then, we 12 could make a temporary decision to go with 13 that. 14 Now, that is already in place. You 15 know, that could work, in my mind. 16 What does everybody else think? MR. FLYNN: It sounds good to me. 17 18 MS. WILLIAMS: I think those 19 temporaries are until the next board 20 meeting. So if there is not a board 21 meeting, then would temporary be good until 22 the next board meeting for them? 23 MR. APPLER: That's what I would think, 24 yes. 25 MR. FLYNN: That has been our practice,

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1	actually, because there have been times we	
2	did not meet and it did carry over to the	
3	next meeting, so we have done that	
4	previously.	
5	MR. APPLER: Yeah.	
6	MS. WILLIAMS: That sounds great. This	
7	is Tonya.	
8	Then let's follow your normal practice	
9	on that.	
10	MR. FLYNN: Okay. That also would be	
11	the ones like space issues and things like	
12	that that you would call the licensing unit	
13	about.	
14	MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.	
15	MR. APPLER: Okay. So we will allow	
16	decisions that need to be made in order to	
17	place children in a safe home, we will do	
18	what we normally do right now between	
19	meetings.	
20	We will not plan on meeting in April	
21	and we will see what May and June look like.	
22	Is that good with everybody?	
23	MS. WILLIAMS: Yes.	
24	MR. FLYNN: Yes.	
25	MS. RUSS: I thought this is Ebony.	

1	I thought that you guys were wanting to
2	try a Zoom meeting for the April board.
3	MR. APPLER: I don't see a phone
4	meeting necessary. I think that well,
5	you know, I would like for everybody to be
6	able to participate and Sanford is not here
7	today.
8	And, so, I think, in light of what we
9	just discussed, if there are any sort of
10	board decisions that need to be made, you
11	can call me. I can make that decision and
12	it will hold until the next official board
13	meeting in May or June.
14	MS. RUSS: Okay.
15	MS. FOTI: Well, I do have one
16	question, Ed. This is Beverly.
17	What about people that are bringing
18	requests for new licenses forward, those
19	kinds of things?
20	MR. APPLER: You know, as far as I'm
21	concerned you mean like for square
22	footage and stuff like that?
23	MS. FOTI: No. To license new beds, or
24	that kind of thing.
25	MR. APPLER: You know, I don't see an

urgent need for a new agency to get a 1 2 license. That's not like there's children 3 waiting to be placed or anything like that. 4 And, you know, I just don't have a 5 problem with new licenses and things waiting 6 until our next meeting. Now, that's just 7 me, you know. 8 What do you guys think? 9 MR. FLYNN: What about this process we 10 had begun? We had an email recently about 11 items that we did not need to bring before 12 the board. Can we deal with those kinds of 13 issues? Are any of those -- is there anyone 14 hung up out there waiting for the board to 15 make a decision on any of these? 16 MS. RUSS: This is Ebony. No. 17 MS. DOHERTY: This is Sandi with DCFS. 18 We do have one that involved -- and it 19 was a provisional that involved the age of 20 the applicant because she was 18 and it was 21 not supported by licensing and we still 22 wanted to present it for the relative. 23 So I don't know how we need to do that 24 because they're not making the placement 25 until the board makes a decision, and they

1 are babies.

2	MR. APPLER: I mean, I thought we we
3	can treat that just like we already treat
4	criminal background checks. And just be
5	sure to keep a record of it and then at the
6	next board meeting, then the full board can
7	ratify the decision that either Charles or I
8	make.
9	MR. FLYNN: Okay. Ed, I think the
10	issue on this one is, though, is the
11	licensing unit does not support that request
12	so DCFS would like to bring it to the full
13	board to discuss.
14	So that means these children will be
15	waiting until our next meeting to have that
16	resolved and not placed with a family
17	member.
18	MS. DOHERTY: Correct.
19	MR. APPLER: Okay. Sandi, do you have
20	the information today?
21	MS. DOHERTY: I will have to go back
22	through my emails. I have it. I mean, I
23	can give you an essence. This is an aunt
24	and uncle, and she is 18, very responsible.
25	She works. She is also furthering her

1 education.

2	The babies are placed together now.
3	They are one and two, have a significant
4	tie with the family. And I think, probably,
5	licensing felt like because of her age, at
6	18 and that's several years from being
7	21 that they could not support that.
8	MS. RUSS: This is Ebony.
9	I think the concern, if I recall, is
10	that the 18-year-old was still in high
11	school at the time. They were not married.
12	She, at the time, did not have a current
13	driver's license.
14	And there was concern of her
15	capabilities of taking care of two young
16	children, ages one and two. I didn't have
17	enough information to see if she was even
18	capable of doing it. And that she was
19	MS. DOHERTY: I think that's go
20	ahead, Ebony. Sorry.
21	MS. RUSS: And the concern, also, was
22	that I think she was still living at her
23	home. She was not living with her fiancé.
24	MS. DOHERTY: Correct. But they
25	were they wanted to go ahead and get the

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1	approval for her to be an applicant because
2	they are going to get married this summer.
3	But we wanted to go ahead and place,
4	and she is going to be the support. There
5	was quite a bit of support.
6	I can Ebony, I can get more
7	information if you need more information on
8	it.
9	MS. RUSS: Yes, that will be helpful.
10	MR. FLYNN: You know, Sandi, I may be
11	wrong, but and we're not adapting this,
12	but isn't the national standard for foster
13	care now 18?
14	MS. DOHERTY: I don't know. I would
15	have to look at that.
16	MR. FLYNN: You may look that up. But
17	it seems like the national standards for
18	foster care did lower that age.
19	It's not something we wanted to
20	consider generally, but just as an added
21	comment.
22	MR. ALTOM: Yes, I would like to add
23	the comment, too, that an 18-year-old can
24	join the military, so I don't see a problem
25	with an 18-year-old being left to be in

charge of a couple of kids. 1 2 MR. FLYNN: Agreed. 3 MS. DOHERTY: Well, she is a senior in 4 high school, but she has also been working a 5 full-time job. I mean, she has been very --6 had to be responsible all her life. 7 But I can provide that information --8 and maybe more Ebony, to you, if you would 9 be more comfortable so that we could get it 10 to the board because we aren't making the 11 placement and it's two little babies not 12 together. 13 MR. FLYNN: Yeah. I think, Ebony, here is the -- those of us who have spoken, she 14 15 can give that temporary approval now if you 16 can provide that information for her. 17 MS. RUSS: Yes, I will do whatever the 18 board decides. 19 MR. APPLER: Well, Sandi is going to 20 get you more information and then you guys can make a decision. 21 22 MS. RUSS: Okay. Thank you. 23 MR. APPLER: Anything else? 24 (No response.) 25 MR. APPLER: Okay. I don't hear
