2	MR. CHAIRMAN: I'm going to call to order the
3	July 24, 2019 meeting of the Child Welfare Agency
4	Review Board, and the first item on the agenda is the
5	approval of the May 2019 minutes. I assume everyone
6	has had a chance to read those.
7	MR. ALTOM: I'll make a motion to approve.
8	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion.
9	MS. DOHERTY: Second.
10	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any
11	discussion?
12	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
13	MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye.
14	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
15	MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same.
16	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
17	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. Okay. I see
18	number 1 and 2 have been scratched off, so number 3.
19	MS. GLANTON: Item 3, Patty Glanton, PRLU. DCFS
20	is requesting a special consideration for Regulation
21	209.2, "Each bedroom shall have at least 50 square
22	feet per occupant." This home will have there are
23	two nieces and one grand niece sharing a bedroom of
24	130 square feet with a total of three occupants. The
25	home has two twin beds and a crib for the three-month-

1 old. Licensing visited the home May 22nd. This is 2 child specific. PRLU supports this request. 3 Temporary approval was granted by Shirley Preston May 9, '19, and I have Casey Tolbert here with Resource if 4 5 you have any questions. MR. CHAIRMAN: So there's a 12-year-old, a 14-6 7 year-old, and a three-month-old, right? 8 MS. GLANTON: Correct. 9 MR. WHATLEY: I make a motion to approve the 10 request. 11 MR. ALTOM: I'll second. 12 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 13 discussion? 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 16 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 18 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 20 MS. GLANTON: Item number 4. DCFS is requesting 21 a special consideration for Regulation 209.2 for 22 Christopher and Amy. "Each bedroom shall have at 23 least 50 square feet per occupant." This home will 24 have two males, a son and a placement nephew sharing a 25 bedroom measuring 83.31 square feet. The room is

furnished with twin bunk beds. The request is child 1 2 specific. Licensing visited the home May 15th of '19, 3 And PRLU supports the request. Temporary approval was granted 4/26/19 by Shirley Preston. 4 This also is request is child specific, and Casey Tolbert is here 5 from Resource if you have any questions. 6 MR. CHAIRMAN: How old are the kids? 7 8 MS. TOLBERT: There are two -- it's two younger 9 kids that are in the room. 10 MR. CHAIRMAN: Like elementary school age or 11 something? 12 MS. TOLBERT: Uh-huh. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. 14 MS. TOLBERT: Yes, sir. 15 MR. ALTOM: I'll make a motion to approve the 16 request. 17 MR. FLYNN: I'll second. 18 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 19 discussion? 20 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 21 If none, all in favor say, aye. MR. CHAIRMAN: 22 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 23 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 24 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 25 MR. CHAIRMAN: DCFS abstains.

MS. GLANTON: Item number 5, Patty Glanton. 1 I am 2 going to step in for Rachel Carlton. DCFS is 3 requesting a special consideration for Regulation 209.2, "Each bedroom shall have at least 50 square 4 feet per occupant." We have four males; 2 placement, 5 6 2 bio to share a room that is 117 square feet. The room is furnished with two twin bunk beds. 7 Temporary 8 approval was granted by Shirley Preston April 29th of 9 '19. PRLU supports this request. This is child 10 specific, and Licensing visited the home May 15th of 11 '19. I have Judy (Inaudible) from Resource if you 12 have any questions. Judy Olinger, sorry. 13 MR. ALTOM: What's the -- I noticed one of the 14 occupants is five years old. The rest of them are 15 pre-teen or almost teenagers; is that correct? 16 MS. OLINGER: Yes, we have an 11, a 17 and a 15. 17 MR. ALTOM: And then a five-year-old. 18 MS. OLINGER: And then a five. 19 MR. ALTOM: Is there any concern about the five-20 year-old? 21 This is not my home, but as far as MS. OLINGER: 22 I know, no. I'm here representing another resource 23 worker. 24 MR. FLYNN: It's fictive kin. What is the 25 relationship with the children.

1 MS. OLINGER: Family friend. They've always been 2 together, the family has. 3 MR. FLYNN: So the kids are friends, too. 4 MS. OLINGER: The kids have grown up together, 5 yes. MR. FLYNN: Okay. This is a single foster 6 7 parent? 8 MS. OLINGER: Yes. 9 MR. CHAIRMAN: So I make a motion we approve the 10 request. 11 MR. FLYNN: I'll second. 12 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any further 13 discussion? 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 16 17 Opposed the same. DCFS abstains. MR. CHAIRMAN: 18 MR. ALTOM: I oppose it. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Pardon me? 20 MR. ALTOM: I'm opposed. 21 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. 22 MR. ALTOM: I don't like the idea of the five-23 year-old being in the room. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Thank you. 25 MS. GLANTON: Item number 6, Patty Glanton for

1 Rachel Carlton. DCFS is requesting special 2 consideration for Regulation 209.2. "Each bedroom 3 shall have at least 50 square feet per occupant." This special consideration will allow three females to 4 5 share a room measuring 120 square feet. The room is furnished with a twin bunk and a toddler bed. 6 7 Temporary approval was granted by Shirley Preston June 8 11th '19. Licensing visited the home 6/21/19. This 9 is child specific. PRLU supports this request, and 10 Judy Olinger is here from Resource if you have any 11 questions. 12 MR. WHATLEY: With it being in the best interest 13 to keep the children together, I'll make a motion to 14 approve the request. 15 MR. ALTOM: I'll second. 16 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any further 17 discussion? 18 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 20 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 21 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 22 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 23 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. DCFS abstains. 24 MS. FANCHER: Susan Fancher with the Placement 25 and Residential Licensing Unit. Item number 7 is a

request from the Curt, Cliff and Opal Young Children's Home. The Agency is requesting an emergency residential type to their already existing license to provide care on an emergency basis in their Hart Home. The agency's total licensing capacity will not be affected by this change. The Young Children's Home has maintained compliance with the minimum licensing standards and the Placement and Residential Licensing Unit supports this request. Here with me today is Administrator Marlon Nelson to answer any questions that you might have.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: This is an interesting time to be seeking this license. Can you explain a little bit behind this reasoning.

MR. NELSON: Sure. With the changes in the laws that we just had, we had some QRTP beds awarded and they've shifted them around all together to one of our places. And so the request was made from Little Rock to see if we could not make that home also be and emergency placement instead of just long-term because we were losing some emergency placement beds otherwise, and because we kind of specialize or primarily have just younger children and our staff is kind of prone to younger children in it, it's so rare you can find a spot for a two and three-year-old at

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1	4:00 in the morning. So we're just trying to be that,
2	you know, place filler, I guess for that.
3	MR. FLYNN: So it'd be just very short term.
4	MR. NELSON: Yes. Yes, sir.
5	MR. FLYNN: So that'll be in a separate house.
6	You'd have QRTP in one house?
7	MR. NELSON: Yes, sir. We ended up with no QRTP
8	in Arkansas.
9	MR. FLYNN: Oh, you
10	MR. NELSON: We have three residential style and
11	then we'll have the one emergency.
12	MR. FLYNN: Okay. All right, I got you.
13	MR. ALTOM: I'll make a motion to approve the
14	request.
15	MR. FLYNN: I'll second.
16	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any further
17	discussion?
18	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
19	MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor signify by
20	saying, aye.
21	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
22	MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same.
23	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
24	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries.
25	MR. NELSON: Thank you.

MR. WHITE: Item No. 8, Lakesha White, Placement and Residential Licensing Unit. I'm here today regarding a special consideration. DCFS is requesting a special consideration for Regulation 209 which states "Each bedroom shall have at least 50 square feet of floor space per occupant." DCFS is requesting this special consideration to allow three males, ages 11, 12, and 14 years old to share a room that is 133 square feet which is 17 square feet less than the 150 square feet needed for 3 people. DCFS would like to place the children in this home to allow them to be placed with family. This request is child specific to the children listed. PRLU granted a temporary 14 approval on 4/30 of '19. A monitored visit to the home was completed on 5/13/19. PRLU supports this request. I have Tracy Holloway here with DCFS if you 17 have any additional questions. 18 MR. CHAIRMAN: And these are nephews of the 19 foster parents? 20 MS. HOLLOWAY: Yes. MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the request. MR. WHATLEY: Second. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any discussion?

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BOARD MEMBERS: No response.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. BOARD MEMBERS: No response.

MR. CHAIRMAN: DCFS abstains. Motion Carries.

MS. WHITE: Item No. 9, Lakesha White, Placement and Residential Licensing Unit. I'm here today regarding a special consideration. DCFS is requesting a special consideration for Regulation 209.10 which states, "Foster children except infants under the age of two years shall not share a sleeping room with adults. This age would increase through age four for the grandparent of the child and a teen parent in foster care with her child." DCFS is requesting this special consideration to allow 17-year-old Sinia (phonetic) to share a room with her grandmother. The bedroom measures 21 x 11 and consists of a twin bed for Sinia and a queen bed for her grandmother. The grandmother has cleared the necessary background and participated in in-home consultation to open as a provisional foster home. The benefits of placing this child in this home is that she will be placed with family and can continue her sibling bond. She will also remain in the same school district. This special

consideration is child specific and time limited. 1 Α 2 temporary approval was granted on 5/3/19. PRLU 3 completed a monitor visit on 5/14/19. PRLU supports this request. I have Yvonne Peeler here with DCFS if 4 5 you have an additional questions. 6 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 7 request. 8 MR. FLYNN: Second. 9 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. I have a 10 question. Is this the granddaughter we're talking 11 about? 12 MS. PEELER: Yes, sir. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Any further discussion? 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 16 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 18 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. DCFS abstains. 20 MS. PEELER: Thank you. 21 MS. WHITE: Item No. 10, Lakesha White, Placement 22 and Residential Licensing Unit. I'm here today 23 regarding a special consideration. Arkansas Baptist 24 Childrens Home is requesting a special consideration 25 for Regulation 209.7 which states, "Children of the

opposite sex shall not share the same bedroom if either child is four years or older except for a parent in foster care with her child." ABC is requesting this special consideration to allow two siblings, a two-year-old male and a four-year-old female to share a bedroom. The siblings will have separate beds with the one-year-old sleeping in a toddler bed and the four-year-old sleeping in a twin bed. ABC would like to place the siblings in this foster home because they will be placed together to maintain their sibling bond. This is a foster home in Crittenden County that has shown exceptional ability to care for the two siblings. This request is child specific to the children listed and time limited until 7/24/21. There was a temporary approval granted on 5/24/19. PRLU supports this request. Ryan --MR. CHAIRMAN: I'm assuming there's a typo in there. MS. WHITE: Yes, there is. MR. CHAIRMAN: So it's a two-year-old or oneyear-old?

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MR. ROBB: Two-year-old.
MS. WHITE: It's a two-year-old.
MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. All right.
MR. WHATLEY: I'll make a motion to approve the

16 1 request. 2 MR. ALTOM: I'll second. 3 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any discussion? 4 5 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 6 7 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 8 MR. FLYNN: I abstain. And Derrick Brown is 9 still our director, so. 10 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. Thank you, ma'am. 11 COURT REPORTER: Lakesha, what is his name? 12 MS. WHITE: Ryan Robb, R-o-b-b. 13 COURT REPORTER: Thank you. 14 MS. PRESTON: That's due to our computer program, 15 Charles. 16 MR. FLYNN: Computer program. We're going to 17 mess y'all up with foster care on computers. 18 MS. PRESTON: Oh, yes. 19 MR. FLYNN: I just don't have the Ranch 20 directory. 21 MS. WHITE: Item No. 11, Lakesha White, Placement 22 and Residential Licensing Unit. I'm here today 23 regarding a special consideration. DCFS is requesting 24 a special consideration for Regulation 209.2 which 25 states "Each bedroom shall have at least 50 square

feet of floor space per occupant." DCFS is requesting this special consideration to allow three males, ages 16, 12, and four years old to share a room that is 141 square feet, which is 9 square feet less than the 150 square feet needed for three people. DCFS would like to place the child in this home to allow him to be placed together with family and bond with his relatives. Ms. W has completed all state background checks and an in-home consultation. This request is child specific to the children listed. PRLU granted a temporary approval on 5/10/19. A monitor visit to the home was completed on 6/20 of '19. PRLU supports this request. I have Yvonne Peeler with DCFS if you have any additional questions. MR. CHAIRMAN: I'm kind of curious because the language says this will permit him to bond with his relatives. Has he had prior contact with his

FLYNN: I'll second. 8 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 9 discussion? 10 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 11 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 12 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 16 MS. WHITE: Thank you. 17 MS. PEELER: Thank you. 18 I'm Darla Thompson with Placement MS. THOMPSON: 19 and Residential Licensing Unit. I'm here on behalf of 20 DCFS who is requesting special consideration for 21 Regulation P209.10 which states, "Foster children 22 except for infants under the age of two years shall 23 not share a sleeping room with adults. This age would 24 increase through the age four for grandparents to the 25 child and a teen parent in foster care with her

child." The foster home is a relative placement of 1 the maternal grandmother. The foster child is a 14-2 3 year-old female. The request is to allow the 14-yearold female to share a bedroom with female 19-year-old 4 5 cousin that returns home during the college breaks. The room meets minimum licensing standards, and this 6 7 would be child specific and time limited until 8 7/31/2021. A temporary approval was granted on 6/7/19 9 by the Licensing Unit. PRLU completed a visit to the 10 foster home on 6/11/2019, and PRLU supports the 11 request. I've got Mary Dobbins, Resource Worker for 12 DCFS present if you need to ask any additional 13 questions. 14 MR. ALTOM: This is just for when she comes back 15 from college or visits. It's not like a 24/7 --16 MR. CHAIRMAN: She'll be in a bedroom by herself, 17 right, until the 19-year-old comes home for a weekend 18 or something and then goes back to college. 19 MS. DOBBINS: That's correct. 20 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 21 request. 22 MR. WHATLEY: Second. MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. 23 Any 24 discussion? 25 BOARD MEMBERS: No response.

DCFS is requesting a special consideration to allow three boys to share a bedroom less than 150 square feet. This will allow the siblings to be placed together with their grandparents. This is a child specific request to the grandchildren of Ralph and Rebecca. A temporary approval was given for this request on 5/17 of '19, and the Licensing Unit supports this request. And the regulation number to this would be 209.2, I forgot to state at the beginning. I have Michelle Brown from DCFS if you have any questions. MR. WHATLEY: The boys are 9, 10, and 12? MR. ARNOLD: Yes.

23 MR. CHAIRMAN: And the 9 and 10 are grandsons,
24 ant the 12-year-old is a cousin of theirs?
25 MS. BROWN: Yes, it's the -- Ralph and Rebecca's

21 1 grandchild as well. 2 MR. WHATLEY: I make a motion to approve the 3 request. MR. ALTOM: I second. 4 5 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Anv discussion? 6 7 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 8 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 9 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 10 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 11 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 12 MR. CHAIRMAN: DCFS abstains. Motion Carries. 13 MS. BROWN: Thank you. 14 Thank you. This is Item No. 15 on MR. ARNOLD: 15 the agenda. Again, Charles Arnold with the Placement 16 and Residential Licensing Unit. This is a special 17 consideration for Standard 209.10. "Foster children 18 except infants under the age of two years shall not 19 share a sleeping room with adults. This age would 20 increase through age four for the grandparents of the 21 child and a teen parent in foster care with her 22 child." DCFS is requesting this special consideration 23 to allow two-year-old Camille and two-year-old Melanie 24 to share a master bedroom with the foster parents. 25 The bedroom is 249 square feet. This is a child

22 1 specific request and time limited to 7-31 of 2021, and 2 the Licensing supports this request. 3 MR. CHAIRMAN: Do the two-year-olds each have their own bed? 4 5 MS. KING: Yes. 6 MR. ARNOLD: And I want to add something. I don't remember, that they were -- they had finalized 7 8 the adoption, and so one of these two-year-old has now 9 been adopted. The other two-year-old is still in 10 foster care. 11 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 12 request. 13 MR. FLYNN: Second. 14 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 15 discussion? 16 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 18 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 20 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 21 MR. CHAIRMAN: DCFS abstains. Motion Carries. 22 MR. ARNOLD: This is Ms. Kim King from DCFS. I 23 have Item No. 16 on the agenda as well. This is a 24 special consideration for Standard 209.10, "Foster 25 children except infants under two year shall not share

1 a sleeping room with the adult. This would increase 2 to age four for a grandparent to the child or a teen 3 parent in foster care with her child." DCFS is requesting this special consideration to allow a 4 foster child to continue to share a room with the 5 bio's son who has turned 18 but is still in high 6 7 This would prevent the foster child to have school. to be moved from the home, and he had been there since 8 9 June of 2018. This is a child specific request and is 10 time limited to 7/31 of 2021. The Licensing Unit 11 supports this request. And again, Kim King with DCFS 12 is here. 13 MR. WHATLEY: I make a motion to approve the 14 request. 15 MR. FLYNN: Second. 16 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. I have a 17 question. I'm not sure I understand. Okay, so the 18 son had turned 18. 19 MS. KING: Uh-huh. 20 MR. CHAIRMAN: And a foster child is going to 21 share the bedroom with the 18-year-old? 22 MS. KING: So he's been -- the foster child has 23 been placed in the bedroom with this now 18-year-old 24 since June of 2018. The bio child turned 18 in 25 December and did graduate in May. The bio child will

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1	remain there an go to college, and this particular
2	two-year-old, he's been TPR'd and so we have
3	disclosure happening on Friday. He should be moved
4	into his adoptive home within the next month.
5	MR. CHAIRMAN: How old is the foster child?
6	MS. KING: Two.
7	MR. CHAIRMAN: Two. There's been a motion and a
8	second. Any further discussion?
9	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
10	MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye.
11	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
12	MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same.
13	BOARD MEMBERS: No response.
14	MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. DCFS abstains.
15	MS. KING: Thank you.
16	MS. ROUSE: Good afternoon, Shannon Rouse,
17	Placement and Residential Licensing Unit. I have Item
18	No. 17 for DCFS. DCFS is requesting a special
19	consideration for Regulation 209.2 which states, "Each
20	bedroom shall have at least 50 square feet of space
21	per occupant." Three children will share a bedroom
22	measuring 134 square feet. A temporary approval was
23	granted 5/23/19. This request is child specific.
24	Based on supporting documentation, PRLU supports this
25	request. I have Dana Yarbrough here with DCFS if you
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25 1 have any further questions. 2 MR. ALTOM: What are the ages? 3 MS. ROUSE: Six, ten, and seven. So the two boys, 6 and 10, and the 4 MR. CHAIRMAN: 5 girl is 7, right? 6 (No audible response) 7 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. And I'm reading this. Ιt 8 says, "Someone is monitoring the children during sleep 9 hours throughout the night." How is that occurring? 10 MS. YARBROUGH: The grandfather is getting up. 11 He's getting up, walking throughout the night, making 12 sure that the kids are asleep. He gets up constantly. 13 But the good thing is, they're getting ready to go on 14 a 60-day trial visit, so they're getting ready to 15 transition back home. 16 MR. CHAIRMAN: How long have they been there? 17 MS. YARBROUGH: Since May. The boys were there 18 in March, but the girl didn't come until later on, 19 until the 24th of May. 20 MR. CHAIRMAN: So is this a request regarding the 21 square footage of the room or is it a request for 22 opposite gender sharing a room? 23 MS. ROUSE: We have both. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. 25 MS. ROUSE: It's different ones.

MS. DOHERTY: It's 17 and 18. 1 MR. CHAIRMAN: Oh, 17 is that one? 2 3 MS. DOHERTY: And 18. 4 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. MR. WHATLEY: So 17 we're voting is for footage, 5 6 correct? 7 MS. ROUSE: Yes. 8 MR. CHAIRMAN: And then 18 would be opposite 9 gender. 10 MR. FLYNN: I'll make a motion to approve the 11 square footage. We need to do that first. 12 MR. CHAIRMAN: Yeah. 13 MR. WHATLEY: I'll second that. 14 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 15 discussion? 16 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 18 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 20 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 21 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. DCFS abstains. 22 Then moving on down to 18. 23 MS. ROUSE: Shannon Rouse, Placement and 24 Residential Licensing Unit. Item No. 18 for DCFS. 25 DCFS is requesting a special consideration Regulation

209.7 which states, "Children of the opposite sex 1 2 shall not share the same bedroom if either child is 3 four years old or older except for a parent in foster care with her child." This is a provisional placement 4 for opposite sex sibling group of three. 5 There will be two males, ages 6 and 10, and one female, age 7 6 7 sharing the same bedroom. A temporary approval was 8 granted 5/23/19. This request is child specific and 9 time limited until 7/31 of 2021. Based on supporting 10 documentation, PRLU supports this request, and Dana 11 Yarbrough with DCFS is here if you have any further 12 questions. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: All three of these kids are 14 grandchildren, right? 15 MS. YARBROUGH: Yes, sir. 16 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 17 request. 18 MR. CHAIRMAN: I'll second that. Motion and a 19 second. Any further discussion? 20 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 21 If none, all in favor say, aye. MR. CHAIRMAN: 22 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 23 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 24 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 25 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. DCFS abstains.

1 MS. ROUSE: Thank you. Shannon Rouse, Placement 2 and Residential Licensing. Item No. 19 for Immerse 3 Arkansas. Immerse Arkansas received a provisional 4 foster care placement license September 25, 2018. 5 Immerse appears to be able to operate in full compliance with minimum licensing standards. 6 The 7 agency has current policies and procedures and 8 qualified staff in place that meets the requirements 9 for this license. PRLU recommends that the agency's 10 provisional foster care placement license be converted 11 into a regular foster care placement license, and I 12 have Leah Williams here with Immerse if you have any 13 further questions. 14 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 15 request. 16 MR. WHATLEY: Second. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 18 discussion? 19 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 20 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 21 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 23 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 25 MS. ROUSE: Thank you.

1 MS. STEPPS: Good afternoon, Fatima Stepps with 2 the Placement and Residential Licensing Unit. I have 3 Item 20 on your agenda for Compact Family Services. This request is for an administrative change to 4 5 correct the agency's license where a previous error 6 was made. Compact Family Services previously 7 requested to lower the capacity of their transitional 8 living license from six to ten children, and they were 9 mistakenly given and independent living licensing for 10 ten children instead. The agency does not have an 11 independent living license, and it's requesting that 12 their transitional living license be reinstated for 13 ten children to correct this error, and the Licensing 14 Unit supports the request. 15 MR. FLYNN: I move we approve this request. 16 MR. ALTOM: Second. 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 18 discussion? 19 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 20 If none, all in favor say, aye. MR. CHAIRMAN: 21 BOARD MEMBERS: Ave. 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 23 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 25 MS. STEPPS: Thank you.

MS. GALUSHA: Good afternoon, Charlotte Galusha with Placement and Residential Licensing Unit, and I'm the licensing specialist assigned to Meritan. Meritan is here to request a special consideration for Regulation 311.6, "The number of children placed into one therapeutic home shall not exceed two." And Meritan is requesting to place a 13-year-old male child into the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. This particular child has been in a residential facility for about four years. It is reported that the child would really like to be in a family setting. There are currently two other TFC children placed in the home. There's an 18-year-old and a 16-year-old male. The 18-year-old female will be attending college in the fall, and this is going to be a little bit of a change from what we originally have here. The original plan was that she was going to move on campus when she started college. I just was informed just a few minutes ago that she is considering staying in the home for her first year, for her freshman year in college. She thinks that she may rather stay in the foster home. Mr. Darrell Johnson is here from Meritan if you have further questions. Of course, if this child continues to stay in the home our end date of 9/1/19 will no longer be valid. A temporary approval

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was granted on 6/8/19, and the Licensing Unit -- it is 1 specific to the children listed. The Licensing Unit 2 3 approves this request. And it has been reported that since the children have been there, since the 4 5 temporary approval was granted that everything has been going well, and there has been no incident 6 7 reports regarding the 13-year-old. 8 MR. ALTOM: All these kids are therapeutic foster 9 care? 10 MR. JOHNSON: Yes. The two older ones are 11 siblings. 12 MR. ALTOM: Okay. I'll make a motion to approve 13 the request. 14 MR. FLYNN: Second. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 16 discussion? 17 MR. WHATLEY: One question. Just making sure the 18 Licensing Unit is approving making a motion to approve 19 the request, but it was also -- when you first 20 approved the request, it was when you thought that the 21 18-year-old was going to be going into college. 22 MS. GALUSHA: Yes. 23 MR. WHATLEY: But you're still --24 MS. GALUSHA: Yes, we are. 25 MR. WHATLEY: Still in agreement, okay.

1 MS. GALUSHA: With my supervisor's approval 2 because we literally just found this out. 3 MS. PRESTON: Yes, given the length of time in 4 the home and the circumstances, we do approve. 5 MS. DOHERTY: Does the 18-year-old have her own 6 room? 7 MR. JOHNSON: Yes. MR. CHAIRMAN: Does each child have their own 8 9 room? 10 MR. JOHNSON: No, the 13-year-old and the 16-11 year-old share a room, the two boys. No sexualized 12 issues with any of the children. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: any further discussion? 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: There's been a motion and a 16 second. All in favor say, aye. 17 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 18 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 19 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 20 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 21 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you. 22 MS. GALUSHA: Again, Charlotte Galusha with 23 Placement and Residential Licensing. Kindred Sprits 24 Adoption Services have requested a change of address 25 to their license. They have recently moved to 900

33 South Shackleford, Suite 300 here in Little Rock, and 1 2 the Licensing Unit supports this request. 3 MR. WHATLEY: I make a motion to approve the 4 request. MS. DOHERTY: Second. 5 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. 6 Any 7 discussion? 8 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 9 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 10 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 11 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 12 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. 14 MS. GALUSHA: Thank you. 15 MR. ARNOLD: Edward S, permission to work with 16 children. 17 MS. PRESTON: It's no longer needed, Charles. 18 MR. ARNOLD: Okay. I'm sorry. Regina M. These 19 next items, the Board members will just be getting the 20 packages, so as they read, we ask for some patience as 21 they read through the information given. 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: This was in 1992? 23 MS. REGINA: Yes. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: And nothing since then? 25 MS. REGINA: No.

1 MS. GRIFFIN: I'm Gayla Griffin. I'm the foster 2 home resource for Area 4 representing Union County, 3 and this is Ms. Regina requesting permission to work with children for her three grandchildren. 4 5 MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the 6 request. 7 MR. WHATLEY: And I'll second. 8 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any 9 discussion? 10 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 11 MR. CHAIRMAN: If none, all in favor say, aye. 12 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 13 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. 14 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: DCFS abstains. 16 MS. GRIFFIN: Thank y'all. 17 MS. HOLLOWAY: I'm Tracy Holloway. I'm the Area 18 8 resource supervisor. I'm here with Mark requesting 19 permission to work with his two grandchildren who are 20 currently in foster care. 21 MS. DOHERTY: I wanted to thank Mr. Bell for 22 coming on short notice. In less than a week, he was 23 able to get off work and be here. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: While we're looking at this, why 25 don't you just share with us what happened. I know

you've written it down, but I'd just like to hear it from you.

MR. BELL: Just all I can really say is that you know, in the past, you know, I did some things that I should not have done, but I have been completely drug free for over 10 years now, and the job I have, I've had for over 8 years. And I do random drug tests and hair follicle to hire in, and I'm just a different person, you know. And I really need those grandkids as bad as they need us.

MR. WHATLEY: Random drug test required by your employer?

MR. BELL: Yes, for everyone that works there.

MR. ALTOM: I make a motion to approve the request.

MR. WHATLEY: Second.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion and a second. Any discussion? BOARD MEMBERS: No response.

20 If none, all in favor say, aye. MR. CHAIRMAN: 21 BOARD MEMBERS: Ave. 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: Opposed the same. DCFS abstains 23 BOARD MEMBERS: No response. 24 MR. CHAIRMAN: Motion Carries. Thank you, sir. 25 MS. HOLLOWAY: Thank you.

MS. PRESTON: Our agenda has changed so many times, you all may not have the list of temporaries. I have one if you would like to see it. They have all either been resolved today or will be on the next Board meeting in September.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: You say we resolved these today?

MS. PRESTON: Yes. There are some that will be heard in September due to our deadline for submissions on the agenda.

MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Other business.

MS. PRESTON: We sent you all some proposed residential standards for field trips, excursions, outings, also for transportation, and some revisions to the transitional living standards which would not require agencies to have an existing residential license. We don't expect a vote on this today. It was our intent for you all to have them so that we can open up the discussion to see if needed some work groups or whatever and then to hopefully have a vote in September.

21 MR. CHAIRMAN: Are the changes to the 22 transitional living, these just sort of to clean up 23 the language?

> MS. PRESTON: It doesn't clean the language up. It would allow an agency that doesn't have an existing
1 license to have this type of program. As it's 2 currently written, if you don't have a residential 3 license, you cannot operate one of these programs. You would first have to have a residential license. 4 MR. FLYNN: Most of the people have a license 5 would prefer to have children that they've had in 6 7 independent living and move them into that program. 8 But that is a part of the Family First Act, I believe, 9 is transitional living. 10 MS. PRESTON: Yes, it is. It's a big piece of 11 it. 12 Shirley, Becky is here if they have MS. DOHERTY: 13 any questions. 14 MS. PRESTON: Oh, okay. I didn't see her come 15 in. 16 MS. DOHERTY: Yeah, I texted her. 17 MS. PRESTON: Come on up, Becky. 18 MR. CHAIRMAN: So would you tell us about the 19 field trips, excursions, outings and why there's a 20 need for this. 21 MS. PRESTON: We had two very recent incidents, 22 one that was fatal, one near fatal. And as we began 23 looking into those incidents, we realized we don't 24 have reqs to address certain situations. And I know 25 that a regulation can't be written for every

situation, but we felt like something needed to be in place for these two situations. When an agency is transporting a child in a volatile situation, and for the field trips, for the supervision, adequate staff.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: The fatality, how did that happen? MS. PRESTON: There was a young woman, a private placement, at a facility. She goes home on the weekends to stay with her mom. It's sort of a -- not a JVC type, but one of those instances. So she goes home on the weekends. She was at her mother's home. She went to a party. Of course, the police responded. They called the shelter to come get the young woman. The shelter responded with one staff. The young woman was intoxicated. However, it resulted in she jumped from the moving van and died as a result of those injuries.

MR. CHAIRMAN: And there's stuff in here about swimming also.

MS. PRESTON: That was a separate incident. It was a child at a facility. Two staff took a group of children swimming. The child -- one child near drowned. She was in ICU for a number of days, recovered thankfully. There were two staff present. This particular child could not swim and was not supervised while she was at the pool. There was no

39 1 lifeguard on duty. One staff left to go get lunch 2 leaving one staff there with a child that couldn't 3 swim, and she was in another area. 4 MS. DOHERTY: It was a teenager. They were older kids. 5 6 MR. CHAIRMAN: A teenager. MS. DOHERTY: That could not swim. 7 8 MS. PRESTON: Yeah, yeah, it was an older girl. 9 MR. CHAIRMAN: And you're wanting us to look at 10 these and think about them and maybe --11 MS. PRESTON: Yes. 12 MR. CHAIRMAN: -- at the next meeting have some further discussion. 13 14 MS. PRESTON: Yes. 15 MS. CHAVIS: Why is a child that can't swim taken 16 to a swimming pool? 17 MS. PRESTON: Our thoughts exactly. MS. DOHERTY: Well, in fairness, she told them 18 19 she was all but an Olympic swimmer. But no one -- I 20 mean, as soon as I saw the video, I knew she couldn't 21 swim, you know, when she was just playing in the 22 water. I mean, we had the videos, and we were watching them. I knew she couldn't swim. 23 24 MS. CHAVIS: Well, at that point, why didn't they 25 say you obviously can't swim --

1 MS. DOHERTY: Good question. 2 MS. CHAVIS: I mean, hello. 3 MS. DOHERTY: Well, but why would one leave to go 4 get lunch and just leave one person, not even on that 5 side of the building where they were swimming? There's a lot of why. 6 7 MR. ALTOM: Was this at a pool? 8 MS. DOHERTY: It was at a town place that people 9 -- anybody can go to. 10 MS. CHAVIS: Like a rec center. 11 MS. DOHERTY: Yeah, indoors. It was indoors. 12 MR. ALTOM: They didn't have lifeguards? 13 MS. DOHERTY: Huh-uh, no lifeguards. 14 MS. CHAVIS: And the sign was posted there. 15 MS. DOHERTY: Clearly no lifequards. 16 MS. CHAVIS: No lifequards. 17 MS. DOHERTY: There's like one giant pool for 18 younger kids, but it's big. It's huge. It's not like 19 a kiddie pool. And then the next side is a big pool 20 for the older kids. And all -- the staff were all on 21 the other end sitting in chairs anyway, so no one 22 would have seen what was going on. 23 MS. CHAVIS: Can any of those people swim? 24 MS. DOHERTY: Actually, one could not, which is 25 interesting. One of the staff members couldn't. And

1 it was a kid that pulled her up from the bottom, 2 another one of the kids. 3 MR. CHAIRMAN: The non-swimmer being supervised 4 by a non-swimmer. 5 MS. DOHERTY: Yes. And the other one going for lunch. 6 MS. CHAVIS: And no one liked my swimming pool 7 8 regulations. It took you a minute. 9 MS. DOHERTY: It did, but I did once I thought 10 about it. 11 MR. ALTOM: The one thing that kind of -- I'm 12 worried about is from reading over these is, you know, 13 the instance where you're -- I think it says in here, 14 "The agency shall ascertain the nature of any need or 15 problem of a child which might cause difficulties 16 during transportation." The kids that we serve, 17 especially for DCFS, I mean, that's -- it could be 18 okay one minute, and the next minute it's not okay. 19 And so how do you know, you know, that's -- and my 20 concern is if this gets too limiting, you can't afford 21 to have that type of monitoring for what, you know, 22 contracts pay and stuff. And so that's one of the 23 issues that I see is if it gets so restrictive, it's 24 going to be very hard for, you know, you want kids to 25 have a somewhat normal life to, you know, to be more

transitioned into society and stuff. If it gets so restricted to where kids can't -- you can't take them anywhere because you're afraid they're going to jump out of the van, you know, -- I just don't understand the -- I get the fact that that can happen, and it has happened. It's happened to us as a provider. But, you know, it's one of those things where most providers know when a kid is that way and they do that, but I don't know that we would, you know, -- the next thing would be is Licensing going to look where you documented that you considered that? I mean, that's -- I'm kind of wondering if this is a knee jerk reaction to a couple of incidents as compared to, you know, backing up and saying, you know, -- I get the fact that you need policies and procedures. I don't have a problem with that but, you know, the adding additional staff to transport and stuff when, you know, -- I just don't know.

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MR. WHATLEY: I agree with Andy. I think we need to look very carefully at it. I would point out, also, a question I had like on No. 4, "The agency shall provide the parent/guardian a description of the activities the child will be engaging or participating in", and then No. 5, "The parent/guardian shall sign a consent form to describe the activity the child will

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be engaging or participating in."

MS. CHAVIS: What if they're in DHS custody?

WHATLEY: I mean, I can't imagine from our MR. agency getting a parent permission for all of the activity. I mean, it would absolutely impossible. You couldn't do it. For one reason, we may not know where these parent are. It may be impossible to get in touch with them. My concern is like Andy's. Obviously, there needs to policies. There's got to be something that's written and just needs to be addressed, but I think we need to be very, very careful about how restrictive we can make this where there's such an overkill with this, that we're doing so much paperwork that we can't do what we really need to paying attention to doing as far as caring for the kids in our care.

MS. DUNAGAN: And I agree, and Shirley can chime in and speak here. But I know one of the ones I felt the strongest about was the swimming. And to your point, whoever, I think we've got someone that can't swim taking someone that can't swim and then by the way, they weren't even supervising them. So -without a lifeguard. So I do believe that there needs to be normal child activity, but any of us, I think whether it be our own children, our own grandchildren

or someone that they're in our supervision, would have handled that differently. And, you know, we've just had some swimming issues over the years. And so actually, I'm the one that initiated the swimming meetings with Shirley, and several of us met. And we'd already dealt with swimming with the foster home licensing so, you know, I do believe -- and the agency put a good interim corrective action plan in place. And I mean, you even go to summer camp. I mean, my kids went to summer camp and they had to prove they could swim or they had to wear a life vest at summer camp.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: So that was one of my questions. How is the agency going to test each child's swimming ability, throw them in the water? I mean, I don't know.

MR. DOHERTY: Well, actually, I took swimming lessons all my life and then taught it. One of the first things you had to do is show you could swim across the pool and back in like the shallow end where you could stand up. You had to demonstrate some kind of a skill before you could go to certain parts of the pool. So it's pretty simple to prove you can at least to swim to stay above the water. This kid couldn't. MS. DUNAGAN: And my son and daughter-in-law and

grandson just recently moved to Colorado. And we went out there, my grandson, and if -- and they -- even a rec center, just exactly where this happened, although they have lifeguards at this Colorado rec center, if -- they had to pass a swimming test, which was just what Sandy said, swim across -- which he can swim like a fish, but -- and if they can't, the parent has to be in the pool with them. So, I mean, I do think that this happened at other places. And, again, both of my kids had to prove they could swim at church camp or you wore a life vest. It wasn't that they said, "Oh, you can't swim." You had to wear a live vest before you got in the pool.

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MR. CHAIRMAN: So under transportation, No. 4, "Transports of children that may be potentially suicidal, aggressive, a flight risk, or a danger," I just don't like the word "may" because any kid may be suicidal, aggressive, a flight risk or a danger to himself or others. You know, I would like to see that -- I mean, that's just any kid right there, you know. Kids in foster care or in a residential treatment program, then every one of those kids may be like this, so I just don't like "may". MS. PRESTON: Duly noted. MS. CHAVIS: How about something like you can't

1 take a kid to a swimming pool where there aren't any 2 lifeguards. 3 MS. DOHERTY: And I hate to do that or are we 4 going to rule out lakes and rivers and everything else? 5 6 MS. CHAVIS: Yeah. 7 MS. DOHERTY: Well, then you've got your normal 8 activities in Arkansas gone. 9 MS. CHAVIS: How many kids get taken to rivers 10 to swim? 11 DOHERTY: Lots and lakes in Arkansas, lots. MS. MR. CHAIRMAN: Foster kids. Like the families 12 13 MS. DOHERTY: That's what we do in Arkansas. 14 MS. CHAVIS: Look, I was born and raised in 15 Arkansas and my family went swimming every summer. 16 What I'm saying, my parents were there watching me 17 swim. They weren't sitting over --18 MS. DOHERTY: We would expect staff to be there 19 watching them swim, too. 20 MS. CHAVIS: Well, sure. But I'm just saying, 21 even if a child -- even if these children had been 22 taken to a rec center pool and no one was watching 23 them, and everybody went to pick up lunch while those 24 kids were swimming, if there had been a lifeguard --25 MS. DOHERTY: I mean, I hear what you're saying,

but the lakes and rivers and stuff don't have lifeguards.

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MS. DUNAGAN: And some rec centers don't have them.

MS. DOHERTY: And we're limited in smaller towns. MS. DUNAGAN: I mean, I think we're wanting some protection, but we're not wanting to make it so restrictive that the children can't have normal activities.

MR. ALTOM: Yeah, I like the policies and procedures. I think this needs to be something that organizations think about and they address it, what sets the expectations for their, you know, for their caregivers when they engage in activities like this. I like that. And I can tell you from running an organization, there's not anything I would want out there that would put us with exposure, but I don't think we should be so prescriptive to say, oh, and if you take them on an outing -- well, number one, we don't have a definition of an outing. It could be to a church. It could be to a ball game, and you've got to add another staff person. I can't afford to do that. And so that's my concern, is that if we get to limiting and it's got to be this way, when I think, you know, common sense is are you addressing the

safety of the kids when they're swimming? Are you addressing the monitoring on outings? You know, do you have a requirement that they maintain ratio? Things like that I'm cool with, but I don't like it whenever you start telling an organization how they have to do it. I think that's limiting a little bit. I think you ought to tell the organization you have to address it.

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MS. PRESTON: And I think from our view, if we just say you have to have a policy that is very subjective to whoever is reviewing that particular incident. I mean, it'll be like Sandy and Julie. One thinks one thing; one thinks the other, and basically say what has to be in that policy, you know, and then --

MR. ALTOM: But I think if you would define it in general terms like you need to, you know, the child's ability -- you assess the child's ability. You assess, you know, what safety procedures or opportunities are on site and what do you need to do in the event that it's not there. You know, those type things where you have the requirement that that's being addressed and looked at and they're planned for, that makes more sense because the, you know, it may be that we say we're going to add a person when you do

1 these type activities, but it may not be something 2 that we necessarily say every time we're going to do 3 something. And we're -- I was talking to you before the meeting. You know, we take all of our kids to 4 5 church camp. We add extra staff for that church camp activity because they're there 24/7 and staff need a 6 7 relief, and we know we don't need to be out of ratio. 8 So, you know, in opportunities like that, we'd have a 9 policy that addresses that. I just think that that's 10 just -- that's my opinion. 11 DUNAGAN: Was there any questions about the MS. 12 Supervised Youth Transition Program? 13 MR. ALTOM: I think it makes sense. 14 MS. PRESTON: Sandy did ask for some 15 clarification, so I'll let you put it out there and 16 see if --17 DOHERTY: MR. Will there was one piece that I 18 was talking to Becky about before we came down here, 19 and I was asking when a child that's over 18, you 20 know, 18 or older -- let me see where it is. Just a second. It says -- here it is. It's under 802 21 22 Eligibility Requirements 1B. "The youth is at least 23 18 years of age and is being transferred from a 24 licensed or exempt program into the transitional 25 living program," and my question was does that include

an apartment, because that's not a transitional program and that's not a licensed program, but we can foresee that being a child we would put in this program. And so -- then Shirley explained, well, it's any foster kid. So then I said, "Then why do you need any words then if it's just -- it can be any foster kid 18 and 21 can go into this program. Because she felt like DCFS is a program.

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MS. PRESTON: Yes, DCFS is a licensed program.

MR. DOHERTY: And I said, "Well, then why do you have to say they have to come from one of these two," because right off I thought apartment is a program. So that was just something that was not clear to me when I read it. And certainly a youth coming from an apartment could very well be an 18 ½, 19 year-old that we've had in an apartment, not in like where they have to have a person living with them, just in a regular apartment but it's not working. They need more structure, and we would want to move them into this program.

MS. DUNAGAN: And I know Charles mentioned this, but it's been part of our family first preservation services Act, which we also think that's right for children and our youth. We need more structure and more independent living programs for our 18 and up

there, but if we do want to draw down any of the 4E funding on those programs, it has to have -- it has to be licensed. So we appreciate Shirley and team working with us on this.

MR. CHAIRMAN: And would this exempt someone from a private placement in a similar setting for an 18year-old? Is that part of the intent in saying they're coming from a program instead of us just admitting a 19-year-old that lives in town that's not in --

MS. PRESTON: That's where the attorneys would need to weigh in because you can't admit a 19-yearold. You can only admit an 18-year-old.

MR. FLYNN: Yeah.

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MS. PRESTON: I mean, under 18 unless it is a DCFS child who still meets the definition of child according to our regs. So a private placement could not enter these unless they did transition directly from that program. If they were at the Ranch for you, then they could go on over into one of your other programs.

MR. DOHERTY: Before they turn 18.
MS. PRESTON: Yes.
MS. DUNAGAN: That wouldn't affect us. I mean,
because we're obviously not trying to -- that'd be

with the program. We're just worried about out children that, you know, getting them some more structured independent living programs plus being able to pull down federal dollars to support that, to support the effort.

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MR. FLYNN: Last September we all met with you and Meg and everybody that have these programs, and everyone had that same concern, so it kind of just really left you without many people to meet this need. So --

MS. PRESTON: Yeah, you couldn't admit a child or a youth off of the street, you know, but you could move them from one of your programs over to another or from your program over to David's if he had a transitional living program. But the way it is now, they can only stay within that program that they entered before they were 18 years old. So if they enter your program prior to age 18, they've got to stay in your program. They can't go over to anybody else's.

MS. DUNAGAN: And if there aren't any more questions for me, I've got to run back upstairs to another meeting.

MR. WHATLEY: I want to go back to the field trips and the outings again, on back on No. 4 and No.

5. It's very concerning to me that we would have to have a consent form and give a description of the activity and have the parent or the guardian sign that form.

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MS. PRESTON: And when we wrote these, David, I mean, we adopted as we always do, we looked at what other states are doing, what other programs are doing and, you know, and what we, at times, you know, do in our licensed programs. And we did start out very strong with them. I mean, you know, so there could be discussion. And, you know, we certainly welcome you all, you know, making comments on any of them before we --

MR. WHATLEY: Well, let me just say something. You can imagine 40 kids in my care and then I'm going out and getting a description of an activity that we do at least four or five times a month and getting consent forms signed by the person that was making placement of that child is just not reasonable. I mean, there's no --

MS. PRESTON: Well, I think you could have a very broad consent form, you know, for --

MR. FLYNN: We probably do that on application, giving us permission --

MR. WHATLEY: We do on application forms.

MS. PRESTON: Yeah.

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MR. WHATLEY: But this looks to me like it's like for every activity.

MR. FLYNN: Well, let's just say somebody offers to do something we've never done before. We have to get permission then, if it's not our normal historical activity or --

MS. PRESTON: Yeah.

MS. DOHERTY: Hang gliding, zip lining.

MS. PRESTON: I mean, you know, if I'm a parent and I place my child there, I expect they're going to church camp and, you know, and they're going to activities in the community. But I don't expect you're going to take them out there parasailing or, you know, those things out of the ordinary.

MR. ALTOM: Yeah, I know Arkansas is, you know, there's still places in Arkansas where you can't get a cell signal. And No. 9 is one of those where I don't know how we're going achieve that if we're going to go to Blanchard Springs caverns because that is an area that you don't have cell phone use, at least we didn't two weekends ago.

MR. FLYNN: Go to Ponca to see the (Inaudible). MR. ALTOM: Yeah, go up to Ponca. MR. FLYNN: Yeah, you don't have cell phone

1 coverage in Ponca. 2 MR. ALTOM: You don't have cell phone coverage. 3 MR. FLYNN: No. 9, is says, "Instant". Yeah, 4 Sandy, we've had -- years ago we'd had a problem 5 living in Colorado with a --MS. DOHERTY: Oh, yeah, we couldn't backpack in 6 7 the Rockies for a month every year. 8 MR. FLYNN: Satellite -- everybody needs 9 satellite phones now. 10 MS. PRESTON: Well, I think the intent there 11 was --12 MR. FLYNN: Yeah, intent. 13 MS. PRESTON: -- I mean, that it be available. Ι 14 mean, you know, --15 MR. ALTOM: Within reason. 16 MS. PRESTON: -- we didn't take into 17 consideration about the signal. I mean, we don't 18 expect that --19 MR. FLYNN: Something besides instant. Maybe 20 different wording than instant, yeah.. 21 MS. PRESTON: Yeah. 22 MR. ALTOM: I mean, I don't have a problem with 23 requiring a cell phone. I just think that you've got 24 to be realistic that, you know, --25 MS. PRESTON: It may not work.

MR. ALTOM: -- you may have to drive a ways to get a signal.

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MR. FLYNN: Or you may have to walk a little ways if you're backpacking.

MS. DOHERTY: I think the whole thing we were so surprised that this facility had nothing in place. It was like we just take them to the swimming pool and then we kind of hang out. We were just shocked there was nothing to say you got to have swimmers with you. You've got to know -- I mean, there was nothing. And so it was just a shock that the facility itself didn't have some kind of already guideline when we take a kid swimming here. You know, you've got to have swimmers with you and X number of adults and know the kids -you know, something. They had nothing.

MS. PRESTON: And as Andy said, you know, you have policies and procedures to address all of those things. Charles does. Andy does.

MS. DOHERTY: But not everybody does.

MS. PRESTON: But not everybody does.

MR. FLYNN: Well, you can require that they have policies and procedures. These are some suggestions, and then as Licensing, you can review those and see if they're thorough enough.

MS. PRESTON: Yes.

1 MS. PRESTON: So my suggestion is that we just 2 all take these back with us. Everybody make their 3 comments, suggestions. You know, if we need to have a committee, you know, to discuss them further prior to 4 the next Board meeting to kind of consolidate them 5 6 some. 7 MS. DUNAGAN: Would there be any way to take the 8 youth transition one out of that because I don't think 9 this is controversial, is it? And we need to go out 10 with a contract pretty soon. 11 MS. PRESTON: Yes, the transitional living, we 12 were hoping for a vote on it today. 13 MS. DUNAGAN: Or even the next meeting. I mean, 14 September meeting is fine. 15 MR. CHAIRMAN: Since this is the first time I've 16 seen that, I'd rather we do that the next meeting. 17 MS. DUNAGAN: September, yeah. September, but 18 when we start about a committee, I'm thinking 19 February, March. 20 MS. PRESTON: Oh, no, no, no. 21 MS. DUNAGAN: September, that would be great if 22 we could do that in September. 23 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Let's plan on that. 24 MR. ALTOM: I know you have to get back, but I do 25 have one other question.

58 1 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. 2 MR. ALTOM: About Families First. 3 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. MR. ALTOM: What's the State's position on IMD's 4 versus the qualified residential treatment programs? 5 The CMS's opinion that just came out that they're 6 7 counting beds regardless if they're cottage settings 8 or if they're all under one roof for providers. 9 MS. DUNAGAN: And we just got that information as 10 well, and we were asking for some opinions on that. 11 So --12 MR. ALTOM: I can send you an email if you'd be 13 interested. 14 MS. DUNAGAN: That would be great. MR. ALTOM: It has some -- it's from an 15 16 association we're trying to get Congress to address 17 the two issues, but it is an issue because the way 18 that's coming down, it's going to affect -- you know, 19 initially I thought, well, we don't have a 16-bed 20 facility that's doing that, but they're counting 21 provider and then the number of beds, and that would 22 hurt. That'd hurt providers. 23 MS. DUNAGAN: Yeah, we're aware and --24 MR. ALTOM: I'll forward you the email. 25 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Please do. And we'll get

1 back to you on that because that came up, and I didn't 2 know if any of our providers had gotten any 3 information on that or not, but it came up to us just -- it just ended up coming up about a week ago. 4 Mischa's out this week, but we had some internal 5 discussions about it, and I didn't think QRTP, I mean, 6 7 because we pay your beds on contract. 8 MR. ALTOM: Right. 9 MS. DUNAGAN: And just because the child might 10 have therapy, just like any other child might have 11 therapy that's billed to Medicaid, you know, but I'm 12 not the expert. But that's the way I saw it. So, but 13 we are waiting for some guidance on that. So do you 14 see it the same way I see it? 15 MR. ALTOM: I see it the same way you see it. 16 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. 17 MR. ALTOM: But CMS doesn't, and that's my worry. 18 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Becky and Andy doesn't 19 matter, huh? Okay. Yeah, I'll make a note of that, 20 Andy. MR. ALTOM: This has a press kit in it about how 21 22 to address it with Congressmen and stuff so it might 23 help. 24 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Yeah. And we actually had 25 the internal discussion and we used your same program

60 1 as an example because I was like, well, just because 2 they have X beds, they're all over the state. 3 MR. ALTOM: Right. 4 MS. DUNAGAN: You know, so if you would send me 5 that, that would be great --6 MR. ALTOM: I will. 7 MS. DUNAGAN: -- and we will get back to you on 8 that. 9 MR. ALTOM: We are sending letters now to 10 Congressmen and stuff --11 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Great. 12 MR. ALTOM: -- but I'll send you what I've got. 13 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Great. Thanks, Andy. Any 14 other questions before I head upstairs? MR. CHAIRMAN: No. We're done. 15 16 MS. DUNAGAN: Okay. Thank you. 17 MR. FLYNN: Thanks, Becky. 18 MS. PRESTON: We do have one other item. Α 19 couple months ago, you all approved the Benton County 20 Alternative Placement, and you gave some specific 21 language that you wanted on the license for those 22 special provisions, and you had asked that we present 23 the license to you for approval before we presented to 24 them, so we have the license with that language. I 25 only have one. I'm sorry. It says, "The special

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1	provisions of the license, admission is limited to
2	voluntary placement by a parent, guardian, legal
3	custodian, or person acting in loco parentis. Parent
4	and child must be included in the development of the
5	case plan." And that's what the Board had agreed upon
6	as the special provisions of the license. We've never
7	put special provisions on a license. They have been
8	provided a license number and all the information.
9	They just haven't received the certificate.
10	MR. CHAIRMAN: I'm good with it.
11	MR. FLYNN: Yeah.
12	MS. DOHERTY: As I recall, they were, too. They
13	were
14	MS. PRESTON: Yes.
15	MS. DOHERTY: willing to go with what
16	(Inaudible).
17	MR. CHAIRMAN: So is there any other "other
18	business"?
19	MS. PRESTON: No other business.
20	MR. CHAIRMAN: So our next meeting is September
21	26, 2019.
22	MS. PRESTON: I believe it's a Thursday.
23	MR. CHAIRMAN: And we're adjourned.
